#### MANAGER'S REPORT

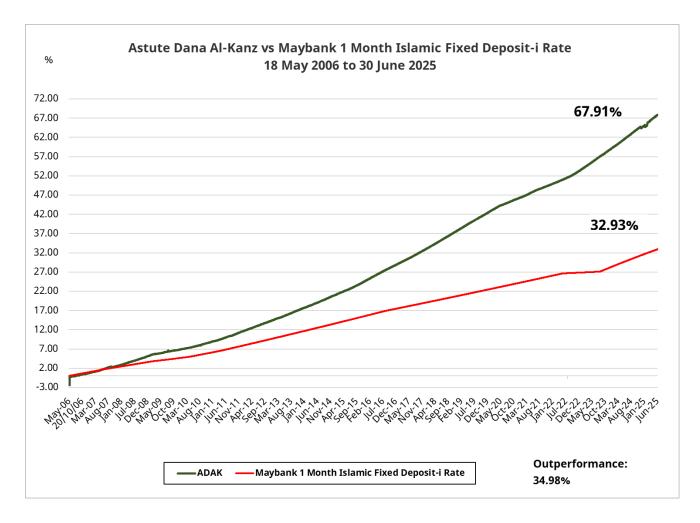
The Fund objective was to seek capital preservation, high level of liquidity and reasonable returns by investing on low risk Shariah-compliant instruments.

For the financial period of review, the Fund had achieved its investment objective. The Fund had provided a total return of 67.91% since its inception as compare to the benchmark return of 32.93%. Hence, the Fund had outperformed the benchmark by 34.98%.

#### **PERFORMANCE ANALYSIS**

The benchmark is based on Maybank's Islamic Saving rate. For the 1 year period ending 30<sup>th</sup> June 2025, the Fund has provided a total return of 3.59%. The Fund has outperformed the benchmark total return of 2.30% for the same period by 1.29%. As at 30<sup>th</sup> June 2025, the Fund's NAV has increased to RM 100,151,922 from RM 55,425,918 as at 30<sup>th</sup> June 2024. The increase in NAV was mainly due to the increase in the units in circulation.

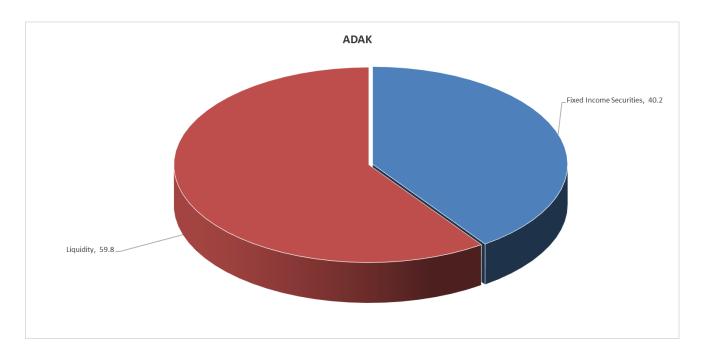

Over the period under review, the Fund maintained a portfolio of short-term Islamic commercial papers and fixed deposits as it focused on providing investors high level of liquidity and capital preservation. Going forward, we will continue to ladder our fixed deposit placements and invest in quality short-term Islamic commercial papers issued by corporates with strong fundamentals.

#### MARKET REVIEW (JUL-2024 TO JUN-2025)

Malaysia's final 1Q25 GDP moderated to a one-year low of 4.4% y/y (4Q24: 4.9%), matching the advance estimate. Both domestic demand and external sector slowed even before the tariff announcement in Apr. While public spending improved, private expenditure moderated as private consumption and private investments also eased.

Bank Negara Malaysia (BNM) maintained the Overnight Policy Rate (OPR) at 3.00% for their three previous MPC meetings which were held in January, March and May this year but cut the Statutory Reserve Requirement (SRR) ratio by 100bps to 1.00%, in their May MPC meeting. The OPR pause came in line with ours and market expectations while the SRR cut was a surprise given previous guidance of sufficient liquidity conditions despite the drop in excess liquidity absorbed by BNM and slower deposit growth. This SRR reduction released approximately MYR19bn worth of liquidity into the banking system. Following the SRR cut, the 3-month interbank rate (3M KLIBOR) has fallen 15bps to 3.50%. The last SRR cut was in Mar 2020 during the onset of the pandemic crisis, also reduced by 100bps. We believe the SRR cut will help support continued lending activities to ensure stable economic activity.

In addition to the SRR cut, there was a more dovish tone in the latest monetary policy statement (MPS). This was primarily due to the uncertainty brought about by US' tariff measures and retaliations by major economies, heightened financial volatility and cautious business sentiment affecting spending and investments. Nevertheless, BNM continues to expect resilient domestic demand as the main anchor of growth for Malaysia with potential upside from favourable trade negotiation outcomes and pro-growth policies in major economies. It added that employment and wage growth, particularly within domestic-oriented sectors, as well as income-related policy measures, will help support household spending. For investments, there is progress on multi-year projects and realization of approved investments and implementation of national master plans.

The positive impact to GDP growth is small at around 0.3% of real GDP according to our calculation. We don't expect the move to have a strong bearing on investor sentiment. Risk appetite will likely continue to be shaped by external factors, especially surrounding US tariff uncertainties. BNM has made it clear that cutting SRR is not a signal on the stance of monetary policy. In other words, the central bank did not inject easing monetary conditions in the latest move.

#### MARKET OUTLOOK

The slower growth momentum reaffirms our expectations for a moderating trend in 2H25. In light of increased external risks and uncertainties, we downgrade Malaysia's 2025 GDP growth forecast to 4.2%, from our earlier projection of 4.5%. The balance of risks now tilts towards growth of 3.8%–4.0%, should tariff and trade tensions escalate further. Potential slower growth in major economies and lingering uncertainties over tariff tensions—particularly following the expiry of the tariff pause period—pose significant downside risks to Malaysia's trade and growth outlook, reinforcing our cautious stance. We also factor in weaker-than expected GDP growth for 1Q25, which came in at 4.4% compared to our estimate of 4.8%, partly due to softness in the mining sector.

Supporting streams could come from a potential extension of the 90-day reciprocal tariff at 10% beyond 9 Jul, with front-loading activity, trade diversion, and slower imports providing some buffer for net trade. Domestic demand remains an anchor of growth with private consumption driven by low unemployment, seasonal spending activities, and tourism events. Ongoing and new fiscal measures including subsidies, financing guarantees for affected businesses, and expediting investments also provide underlying support for growth. Malaysia has started negotiations with US officials to seek

lower reciprocal tariffs. However, there remains ongoing US Section 232 investigations that could lead to additional tariffs on pharmaceuticals, semiconductors & manufacturing equipment, copper, timber & lumber, and critical minerals.

In their May MPC meeting, BNM shifted to a more dovish tone that signals the central bank's readiness to ease monetary policy given a benign inflation outlook and rising downside risks to growth. Other factors that pave the way for OPR cuts include a stronger MYR, lower commodity prices and softer demand that ensures the RON95 subsidy rationalization to have a minimal impact on inflation. The government has deferred the subsidy plan rollout to 2H25 while finalizing eligibility of the subsidies that will continue to benefit 95% of Malaysians. We pencilled in two 25bps OPR cuts in 2H25. The next monetary policy meeting (8-9 Jul) coincides with the end of the 90-day reciprocal tariff pause.

Closely linked to the developments in the CNY, the MYR rose over 4% in 2Q-to-date, pacing gains in the region after the US-China trade tensions showed signs of easing off. Flows also underpinned the resilience of the MYR. Foreign investors turned net buyers of Malaysian debt securities (+MYR13.4bn in Mar-Apr) while foreign reserves rose to USD 119.1 bn as at mid-May (vs. USD 116.2 bn at end-2024).

That said, the MYR's sharp rebound seems overdone, having returned to pre-Trump 2.0 levels of around 4.20/ USD. Markets may have prematurely priced out tariff related risks, despite ongoing trade war uncertainty. We expect some consolidation in the MYR as investors await clearer global tariff signals. Additionally, our forecast of two 25 bps BNM OPR cuts in 2H25 could further weigh on the currency. Overall, our updated USD/MYR forecasts are 4.32 in 3Q25, 4.27 in 4Q25, 4.24 in 1Q26 and 4.20 in 2Q26.

#### DISTRIBUTIONS

For the financial year under review, the fund has declared an income distribution of RM0.0013 per unit for both Class A and Class B.

#### STATE OF AFFAIRS OF THE FUND

There were no significant changes in the state of affairs of the Fund during the financial year and up until the date of the manager's report, not otherwise disclosed in the financial statements.

#### SECURITIES FINANCING TRANSACTIONS

The Fund has not undertaken any securities lending or repurchase transactions during the financial year under review.

#### **DETAILS OF ANY UNIT SPLIT EXERCISE**

The Fund did not carry out any unit split exercise during the financial year ended 30 June 2025.

#### 1. THE FUND, THE MANAGER AND THEIR PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

Astute Dana Al-Kanz ("the Fund") was constituted pursuant to the execution of a Deed dated 28 March 2006 ("the Deed"), between the Manager, Astute Fund Management Berhad and the registered unitholders of the Fund. The First Supplemental Deed dated 3 August 2015 entered into between the Manager and MTrustee Berhad was further modified to include a provision relating to goods and services tax. The Second Supplemental Deed dated 15 April 2016 between the Astute Fund Management Berhad and the Trustee, Maybank Trustees Berhad modified the appointment date for the change of the trustee from MTrustee Berhad to Maybank Trustees Berhad. The Third Supplemental Deed dated 19 March 2018 between the Astute Fund Management Berhad and the Trustee, Maybank Trustees Berhad was further modified to bring it in line with terminology used for Shariah-compliant funds and the recent amendments to the relevant guidelines. The Fourth Supplemental Deed dated 22 April 2022 between the Astute Fund Management Berhad and the Trustee, Maybank Trustees Berhad modified the name of the Manager and the name of Fund. By a Fifth Supplemental Deed dated 11 January 2023 between the Manager and the Trustee, the Principal Deed was further modified to provide for the participation of Unit Holders in a Unit Holders' meeting by any electronic communication facilities or technologies available and the amendments essentially entailed on the amendments to the provisions of the Principal Deed to be in line with the Guidelines on Unit Trust Funds revised on 28 November 2022. By a 6th Supplemental Deed dated 27 March 2024 between the Manager and Trustee, the Principal Deed was further modified that unit of the Fund will split into Class-A and Class-B where individual Unit Holders will categorise under Class-A and nonindividual Unit Holders will categorise under Class-B.

The principal activity of the Fund is to invest in "Permitted Investments" as defined in the Second Schedule of the Deeds. The Fund commenced operations on 18 May 2006 (date of inception) and will continue its operations until terminated by the Trustee or the Manager as provided under Clauses 12.1, 12.2 and 12.3 of the Deeds.

The investment objective of the Fund is to seek capital preservation, a high level of liquidity and reasonable returns by investing in low risk Shariah-compliant instruments.

The Manager is Astute Fund Management Berhad, is a company incorporated in Malaysia. The principal activity of the Manager is the management of unit trust and wholesale funds.

The financial statements of the Fund are presented in Ringgit Malaysia ("RM") which is the functional and presentation currency of the Fund.

The financial statements were approved by the Board of Directors of the Manager on 26 August 2025.

#### 2. BASIS OF PREPARATION

The financial statements of the Fund are prepared under the historical cost convention and modified to include other bases of valuation as disclosed in other sections under material accounting policy information, and in compliance with Malaysian Financial Reporting Standards ("MFRSs") and IFRS Accounting Standards ("IFRSs").

2.1 During the current financial year, the Fund has adopted the following new accounting standards (including the consequential amendments, if any):-

#### 3.1 CRITICAL ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND JUDGEMENTS

In the process of applying the accounting policies of the Funds, the management is not aware of any judgements that have significant effects on the amounts recognised in the financial statements.

There are also no assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation of uncertainties at the end of the reporting period, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year.

#### 3.2 FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

#### (a) Financial Assets

#### Financial Assets Through Profit or Loss

The financial assets are initially measured at fair value. Subsequent to the initial recognition, the financial assets are remeasured to their fair values at the reporting date with fair value changes recognised in profit or loss. The fair value changes do not include profit income.

#### Financial Assets at Amortised Cost

The financial assets are initially measured at fair value plus transaction costs except for trade receivables without significant financing component which are measured at transaction price only. Subsequent to the initial recognition, all financial assets are measured at amortised cost less any impairment losses.

#### (b) Financial Liability

#### Financial Liabilities at Amortised Cost

The financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value less transaction costs. Subsequent to the initial recognition, the financial liabilities are measured at amortised cost

#### (c) Equity Instruments

#### Unitholders' Capital

Unitholders' capital are classified as equity and recorded at the proceeds received, net of directly attributable transaction costs.

The unitholders' contributions to the Fund meet the criteria of puttable instruments classified as equity instruments under MFRS 132 - Financial Instruments Presentation. Those criteria include:-

- the units entitle the holder to a proportionate share of the Fund's NAV;
- the units are the most subordinated class and class features are identical;
- there is no contractual obligation to deliver cash or another financial asset other than the obligation on the Fund to repurchase; and
- the total expected cash flows from the units over its life are based on substantially on the profit or loss of the Fund.

#### NAV Attributable to Unitholders

NAV attributable to unitholders represents the total NAV in the statement of financial position, which is carried at the redemption amount that would be payable at the end of the reporting period if the unitholders exercised the right to redeem units of the Fund.

Units are created or cancelled at prices based on the Fund's NAV per unit at the time of the creation or cancellation. The Fund's NAV per unit is calculated by dividing the net assets attributable to the unitholders with the total issued and paid-up units as of that date.

#### Distributions

Distributions are at the discretion of the Fund. A distribution to the Fund's unitholders is accounted for as a reduction from realised reserves. A proposed distribution is recognised as a liability in the period in which it is approved.

#### 3.3 CLASSIFICATION OF REALISED AND UNREALISED GAINS AND LOSSES

Unrealised gains and losses comprise changes in the fair value of financial instruments for the period and from reversal of prior period's unrealised gains and losses for financial instruments which were realised (i.e. sold, redeemed or matured) during the reporting period.

Realised gains and losses on disposal of financial instruments classified as part of at fair value through profit or loss are calculated using the weighted average method. They represent the difference between an instrument's initial carrying amount and disposal amount.

#### 3.4 INCOME TAXES

Current tax assets and liabilities are the expected amount of income tax recoverable or payable to the taxation authorities.

Current taxes are measured using tax rates and tax laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the end of the reporting period and are recognised in profit or loss except to the extent that the tax relates to items recognised outside profit or loss (either in other comprehensive income or directly in changes in NAV).

#### 3.5 INCOME RECOGNITION

# (a) Realised Gains or Losses on Sale of Investments

Realised gain or loss on the sale of an investment is recognised based on the sale proceeds less cost which is determined on the weighted average cost basis.

#### (b) Profit Income

Profit income is recognised on a time proportion basis taking into account the principal outstanding and the effective profit rates applicable.

#### 4. MANAGEMENT FEE

Clause 13.1 of the Deed provides that the Manager is entitled to a management fee computed daily on the net asset value attributable to unitholders of the Fund at a maximum rate of 2.0% (2024 - 2.0%) per annum. The management fee recognised in the financial statements is computed based at 0.2% (2024 - 0.2%) per annum for the financial year.

# 5. TRUSTEE'S FEE

Trustee is entitled to a fee at such rate as may be agreed from time to time between the Manager and the Trustee. The Trustee's fee recognised in the financial statements is computed daily at 0.05% (2024 - 0.05%) per annum of the net asset value attributable to unitholders of the Fund.

#### 6. INCOME TAX EXPENSE

There was no income tax expense for the financial year as the Fund did not earn any chargeable income during the financial year.

The overall financial risk management policy focuses on the unpredictability of financial markets and seeks to minimise potential adverse effects on the financial performance of the Fund.

#### 18.1 FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT POLICIES

The policies in respect of the major areas of treasury activity are as follows:-

#### (a) Foreign Currency Risk

The Fund does not have any transactions or balances denominated in foreign currencies and hence, are not exposed to foreign currency risk.

#### (b) Profit Rate Risk

Cash and other fixed income securities are particularly sensitive to movements in profit rates. When profit rate rises, the return on cash and the value of fixed income securities will rise whilst it will be vice versa if there is a fall, thus affecting the NAV of the Fund.

The Fund's fixed deposits with licensed banks are carried at amortised cost. Therefore, they are not subject to profit rate risk as defined in MFRS 7 since neither the carrying amounts nor the future cash flows will fluctuate because of a change in market interest rates.

The Fund's deposits with financial institutions are usually rolled-over on a daily/monthly basis.

It is the Fund's policy not to enter into interest rate swap arrangements.

# **Profit risk sensitivity**

Profit rate risk sensitivity is not presented as a reasonable possible change in profit rates will not have a significant impact on the net income for the financial year.

#### (c) Particular Stock Risk

The Fund does not have any quoted investments and hence, is not exposed to equity price risk.

#### (d) Liquidity and Cash Flow Risks

Liquidity and cash flow risks refer to the ease to convert investments into cash without significantly incurring loss in value. Stocks issued by smaller companies will face a greater chance of liquidity risk as compared to stocks issued by larger companies. When investing in stocks of smaller companies, the historical volume traded would be analysed to minimise the liquidity risk.

#### (e) Fund Manager's Risk

The performance of the Fund is also influenced by the expertise of the Fund Manager. The investment committee will oversee the activities and performance of the Fund Manager. There is also the risk that the Fund Manager does not adhere to the investment mandate of the Fund. The investment committee and the compliance unit hold primary functions to ensure that the Fund's investment strategy and mandate are adhered to. A compliance checklist and investment performance report shall be presented for review during the investment committee meeting.

#### (f) Credit Risk

The Fund has no exposure to credit risk, or the risk of counterparties defaulting, other than sundry receivables.

#### (i) Credit Risk Concentration Profile

The Fund does not have any major concentration of credit risk related to any individual customer or counterparty.

#### (ii) Maximum Exposure to Credit Risk

As the Fund does not hold any collateral, the maximum exposure to credit risk is represented by the carrying amount of the financial assets as at the end of the reporting period.

#### (iii) Assessment of Impairment Losses

At each reporting date, the Fund assesses whether any of the financial assets at amortised cost are credit impaired.

The gross carrying amounts of financial assets are written off against the associated impairment, if any, when there is no reasonable expectation of recovery despite the fact that they are still subject to enforcement activities.

#### Receivables

The Fund applies the simplified approach to measuring expected credit losses which uses a lifetime expected loss allowance for all receivables.

A financial asset is credit impaired when the receivable is in significant financial difficulties.

The Fund considers a receivable to be in default when the receivable is unlikely to repay its debt to the Fund in full or is more than 90 days past due.

#### Deposits with Licensed Banks and Bank Balances

The Fund considers the licensed banks have low credit risks. In addition, some of the bank balances are insured by Government agencies. Therefore, the Fund is of the view that the loss allowance is immaterial and hence, it is not provided for.

#### (g) Shariah Specific Risk

The risk that the investments do not conform to the principle of Shariah may result in those investments being not Shariah compliant. Should the situation arise, necessary steps shall be taken to dispose of such investments in accordance with the rules of divestment of non Shariah-compliant investments. If this occurs, the Fund could suffer losses from the disposal and thus, adversely affecting the value of the Fund.

#### 18.2 CAPITAL RISK MANAGEMENT

The Manager of the Fund manages the capital of the Fund by maintaining an optimal capital structure so as to support its businesses and maximise unitholders value. To achieve this objective, the Manager may make adjustment to the capital structure in view of changes in economic conditions, such as adjusting the amount of dividend payment, returning of capital to unitholders or undertake a unit splitting exercise to lower the value per unit of the Fund, thus the units become more affordable to raise more funds.
